LETTER FROM THE MINISTER

The opening words of Liam Fraser's book, Mission in Contemporary Scotland have a sombre tone: "The summer is over, and we have not been saved. For though we are still standing, we stand at the end of an age, one that will never rise again. The bowl lies broken, the golden cord is snapped, and the aged church peers through the blinds into a world grown dark, and strange and forbidding."

Some may argue that Dr Fraser echoes his namesake in the television series, Dad's Army, Fraser the lugubrious Scottish funeral Director, with his catchphrase, "Doomed, doomed, we're a' doomed!" Whether or not you agree, it is hard to argue that these are not hugely challenging times of mainstream western churches, including the Church of Scotland. We have heard the story of falling numbers, too few ministers, too many buildings to maintain and too little money with which to maintain them.

When I was inducted to Dunblane Cathedral, almost ten years ago, there were two full-time ministers in post, and there was no talk of union with any neighbouring congregations, although a linkage with Kilmadock Church in Doune had been discussed some quarter of a century earlier. Within two years of coming to Dunblane, I was asked to convene a committee to revise the existing Presbytery Mission Plan, with the knowledge that the allocation of ministers to the Presbytery of Stirling, as it still was back then, would drop from 34 to around 20. Clearly, tough decisions were going to have to be made, not simply in this area, but throughout the whole Church of Scotland.

It was only in 2023 that the Presbytery Mission Plans for all the constituent presbyteries within the new Presbytery of Perth were finally approved, and now the slow process of their implementation began. The overall plan for this area should be known to most of you – a proposed union of the congregations and Kirk Sessions of Dunblane Cathedral, Kilmadock and Kincardine in Menteith, with one full-time Minister of Word and Sacrament and one Ordained Local Minister (part-time and not in receipt of a stipend).

I am happy to report that although I suspect the status quo might have been the preference of many, discussions between representatives of the Presbytery and all three Kirk Sessions have been positive and

amicable and a Draft Basis of Union has now been drawn up. It is as follows:

The congregation of Dunblane Cathedral Church of Scotland (SC004454) and the congregation of Kilmadock Parish Church of Scotland, Doune (SC012031) and the congregation of Kincardine in Menteith Church of Scotland, Blair Drummond (SC000802) shall be united on 2 May 2024, or from a date to be determined by Presbytery, on the following terms and conditions:

- 1. Name: The name of the united charge shall be Dunblane Cathedral, Kilmadock and Blair Drummond Church of Scotland and the charity number SC0004454 will be retained.
- 2. Transference of Property and Funds: The property and funds belonging to or held on behalf of each congregation shall belong to or be held on behalf of the united charge and any transference necessary shall be duly effected.
- 3. Places of Worship:
- The churches at present used and occupied by the congregations of Dunblane Cathedral and of Kilmadock shall be the places of worship of the united charge. Services shall be conducted in both churches each Sunday at times to be decided by the Minister and Kirk Session.
- The church at present used by the congregation of Kincardinein-Menteith shall be sold, let or otherwise disposed of subject to the titles on which it is held, subject to the approval of the Presbytery and, if necessary, the General Trustees or the General Assembly.

- The free proceeds of any such sale or let shall be held and applied for fabric purposes in connection with the properties of the congregation.
- Until the sale, let or disposal of the Kincardine-in-Menteith church is completed, which shall be as soon as is practicable, it shall be used as an additional place of worship of the united congregation on at least one Sunday each month, on dates and times to be decided by the Minister and Kirk Session.
- 4. Territorial Responsibility: The bounds to be served by the united charge shall be designated as the bounds of the parishes of Dunblane Cathedral, Kilmadock and Kincardine-in-Menteith, or as the Presbytery shall determine.
- 5. Kirk Session: The elders of all three Kirk Sessions shall form, with the minister, the Kirk Session of the united charge.
- 6. Congregational Management: The temporal affairs of the united congregation shall be administered by the Kirk Session of the said congregation.
- 7. Minister: The Rev Colin Renwick, currently minister at Dunblane Cathedral, shall be the minister of the united charge.
- 8. Manse: The manse of the congregation of Dunblane Cathedral shall be the manse of the united charge.



- 9. Ministerial Support: The stipend of the charge shall be paid in accordance with the terms of the National Stipend Scheme.
- 10. Power to Readjust: While these articles and terms shall form the Basis of Union for the three congregations now uniting, the united charge shall be free, like other congregations, to adjust arrangements under the authority of Presbytery as need may arise.

Although couched in the rather formal language of the Church of Scotland, the terms of the proposed union should be fairly clear. There will continue to be a weekly service in Dunblane Cathedral and at Kilmadock in Doune, and once a month at Kincardine in Menteith Church until such time as that building shall be sold. Instead of three Kirk Sessions, as is currently the case, there will be only one Kirk Session for the new charge of Dunblane Cathedral, Kilmadock and Blair Drummond Church of Scotland.

Each Kirk Session and each congregation will be given the opportunity to vote on the proposed basis of union, and Kilmadock and Kincardine in Menteith will be given the opportunity to vote on whether or not they will accept me as their minister. Dunblane Cathedral had the opportunity to vote for me ten years ago when I preached here as sole nominee.

The Dunblane Cathedral Kirk Session will meet to vote on the draft basis of union on Sunday 11 February 2024 and the whole congregation will be asked to do likewise, following morning worship on Sunday 3 March 2024. The voting will be by secret ballot and in person only and all members and recognised adherents are eligible to vote. You are encouraged to be present and to vote.

If all three Kirk Sessions and congregations vote for the proposed union, the three congregations will formally be united on 2 May 2024 with a formal service of union to take place at an agreed date.

Some may well be asking, "What will change?" There will, after all, still be a service in Dunblane Cathedral every Sunday. Dunblane Cathedral is, by a fair margin, the largest of the three congregations with the greater financial resources. Will the Cathedral congregation really notice the difference, especially when the union is with congregations in different communities?

I think my answer would be that if we, in Dunblane Cathedral don't notice any great difference, it is likely that this new union isn't working as it should. Whilst it is not likely that this union will mean any great influx of people into Dunblane Cathedral, it is important that those from all three congregations get to know one another as one united congregation, and that will take a determined effort on the part of all. It should also present all the constituent congregations with the opportunity to review, openly and critically, what they have done in the past (which all

congregations should be doing anyway) in order that together, we can plan future mission and service within our varied communities. Dunblane Cathedral may have the greater numbers and the larger income, but it doesn't mean that we have the monopoly of wisdom or insight. Kilmadock, for example, could have much to teach us about developing the capacity of our members for leadership in worship. Kincardine in Menteith, which has given strong support to the local farming community in the past, could have much to share with us in developing what they have called "Faith in Farming".

Am I daunted at what this union holds for us as a congregation and for me as a minister? Yes, I am. I have noticed a marked change in workload since Dorothy Anderson's retirement in 2021, and I have yet to find out how it will change with this new union. Furthermore, any minister I know who has journeyed with congregations through unions in the past, tells me that it can be challenging and hard work.

Am I excited at what the union holds for us as a congregation and for me as a minister? Yes, I am. I am looking forward to getting to know new people. I am looking forward to discovering more about how Kilmadock Church has developed the capacity of its members in leading worship, and as a country lad, I am looking forward to discovering how the newly united charge might engage further with the farming community within the Parish of Kincardine in Menteith. I shall have to learn how to delegate more. I shall have to learn how to say, "no" a little more often and trust that not every meeting requires the minister to be present. I am looking forward to a long-awaited restructuring of Kirk Session and Committees in a way that, I hope and pray, recognises, draws upon and encourages the gifts of people from all three communities.

Liam Fraser's book on Mission in Contemporary Scotland, begins with a sombre and rather ominous note as a wake-up call to those of us in the Church of Scotland. However, he finishes with a positive and practical note. In his final chapter, he asks, "What next?" - a question I and others shall doubtless be asking over the next few months, and indeed through my last year or two as minister at Dunblane Cathedral. Kilmaock and Blair Drummond Church of Scotland. Dr Fraser's suggestions are ones to which would be wise to turn:

- 1. Pray
- 2. Meet with others
- 3. Learn
- 4. Seek further support
- 5. Consult
- 6. Pilot
- 7. Refine
- 8. Thank God for the opportunity to try to make this world a better place and to show something of his love and glory to others.

It is some time now, since Dunblane Cathedral had a paid administrator. In recent times, Ronald Wright has looked after hall bookings, Chris Wilson has produced orders of Service and Alistair Brunton has dealt with accounts for weddings and hall lets. Gratitude is due to all three for all their time and hard work.

The Kirk Session has agreed that the time has come to consider the appointment of a new administrator. In the meantime, they have agreed to the appointment of Eilidh Renwick as Acting Administrator for a 3-6 month period as she assesses what the role of Administrator might now entail, especially in the light of the proposed union of three congregations. Eilidh, who will be doing this in a voluntary capacity, will be working in the Cathedral Office in the Halls from 9am-12pm, Wednesday-Friday.

PIONEER MINISTER TO THE UNDER 40S

Following the appointment of Rev Ruth Kennedy as Minister to Sanctuary First and Director of Digital Ministries within the Church of Scotland, the Kirk Sessions of St Blane's and Dunblane Cathedral reflected on the work that Ruth had initiated in her year as Pioneer Minister with the under 40s within Dunblane, and were of the opinion that this work should be continued and developed, if possible.

An application for Funding was made on behalf of both Kirk Sessions to the Church of Scotland Seeds for Growth Fund in order that another Pioneer minister/worker with the under 40s be appointed. It was confirmed in December that this application has been successful with a grant of £100,000 being offered over a three-year period to fund such an appointment. It is hoped that the appointment process may begin within the next few weeks.


DUNBLANE COMMUNITY LUNCH CLUB
